

Timelines for English tenses

CONDITIONALS

- **1. Zero conditional:** (if + present simple)
- e.g. -- My eyes get tired if I use computer a lot. -- If you mix blue and yellow, you get green. -- If you don't know the answer, just guess.
- 2. First conditional: (if+ simple present * (will) + infinitive without "to")
- e.g. -- If you phone her, she'll be happy. / She'll be happy if you phone her. -- If I finish my homework early, I might call you.
- 3. Second conditional: (if+ simple past * would + infinitive without "to")
- e.g. -- If I knew the answer, I would tell you. / I would tell you if I knew the answer. If I were you, I would study for the test./I would study for the test if I were you.
- **4. Third conditional:** e.g. If you hadn't taken a map, we would've gotten lost.
- 5. Mixed conditional:
 - 3-2 > If you'd listened to my advice, you wouldn't be in this situation now! 2-3 > If you brought a map, we wouldn't have gotten lost!
- **6. Alternative words for if:** I'll lend you some money as long as you give it back tomorrow.
